

FAMILY PROGRAMS

MHC's family reading program, Read from the Start (RFTS), encourages parents/caregivers to read to their young children regularly—helping them to form early habits that foster a lifelong love of reading. Through the guidance of certified RFTS Discussion Leaders, these hands-on workshops provide participants with exciting ways to read as a family and discuss the same books they will take home free of charge. In partnership with organizations who share a commitment to family reading and literacy, MHC presented 81 RFTS programs in FY2017, reaching 1,143 parents/caregivers in 36 counties across the state of Missouri.

VETERANS PROGRAMS

Writing Workshops: MHC offered five Veterans Writing Workshops with 101 total participants in FY2017. Each workshop consists of weekly sessions that span a five-week period. They are offered free of charge and taught by professional writers who provide guidance to both new and experienced writers learning to share their stories. Partner organizations include:

Anthology Series: This fiscal year also marked the release of the fifth volume of our anthology series, *Proud to Be: Writing by American Warriors*. MHC, in partnership with Southeast Missouri State University Press, publishes this creative writing anthology with submissions by and about veterans from across the nation. There were 261 submissions reviewed for publication in the fifth volume, spanning multiple generations of combat and peacetime military experience.





HERITAGE PROGRAMS

Civil War Heritage: The Fourth Annual Ulysses S. Grant Symposium was held on September 19, 2017 at Cape Girardeau's Heritage Hall. The event featured Ronald C. White, author of *American Ulysses* (Random House 2016) and several other Missouri scholars on the life and times of Ulysses S. Grant. The symposium was organized by Missouri's Civil War Heritage Foundation in collaboration with MHC.

German Heritage: In FY2017, MHC began work on a comprehensive interpretive plan for the German Heritage Corridor, which includes steps for implementing public programming, traveling and permanent exhibits, and digital components for the Corridor—a 16-county historic settlement tract (including St. Louis City) along the Missouri River. The finished product will guide the organization as we continue to raise awareness of Missouri's rich German heritage.







Native American Heritage: MHC partnered with TYCOR's Urban Tribal Embassy to host the Seventh Annual Harvest Moon American Indian Festival on October 7, 2017 in Kansas City. The event honored 13 American Indian Tribes with memorial plaques commemorating their contributions to the history and culture of Missouri.

MHC is also working to locate and mark historic sites along the Trail of Tears in Missouri—an ongoing project with important developments on the horizon.

Cultural Heritage Workshops: Our newest heritage initiative offers daylong workshops for rural communities. Nonprofit and educational professionals share with participants the tools and resources necessary to develop or expand cultural heritage programming in their communities.

EDUCATION PROGRAMS

Show Me Missouri: Conversations about Missouri Past, Present, and Future is a Speakers Bureau program organized and managed by MHC and the State Historical Society of Missouri. A roster of 33 scholars and experts gave presentations on topics related to the history, culture, geography, and people of Missouri for community-based organizations around the state. During FY2017, MHC offered 55 programs to a collective audience of over 2,500.

Civics Education Initiative: The Second Annual Missouri Summer Teachers Academy was held June 12-15, 2017 in Columbia. The Summer Teachers Academy enables high school social studies educators from all corners of the state to gain further expertise in their primary subject fields by spending three days closely studying a theme from American political and constitutional history alongside Mizzou faculty and other regional scholars. The theme for the 2017 Teachers Academy was the origins and ever-evolving legacy of the Bill of Rights.

Exhibits:

Missouri Over There is a traveling exhibit commemorating the centennial of America's entry into World War I and the 156,000 Missourians who served in the war. The exhibit opened in July 2017 at the Missouri State Capitol. It was created in partnership with the Springfield-Greene County Library and will travel to different host locations around the state until December 2019.


The Bill of Rights: MHC placed pop-up exhibits commemorating the 225th anniversary of the Bill of Rights in 22 libraries across the state. The exhibits were provided free of charge by The National Archives and the Federation of State and Territorial Humanities Councils and included guides for public programming and online education. Programs offered at host libraries in Missouri have included a range of panel discussions and guest speakers that explored the power of the Bill of Rights and our enduring system of government.





SPRINGFIELD OFFICE

In August of 2017, MHC opened a new office in Springfield in partnership with the newly formed Humanities and Ethics Center at Drury University. Dr. Katherine Gilbert, Associate Professor of English at Drury, serves as MHC's Field Representative for the Springfield Office. With her support, MHC is using this satellite location to increase its programmatic output in the rural areas of Missouri.

GRANTS

In FY2017, MHC awarded \$468,662 in grants and sponsorships statewide, supporting seventy-five Missouri non-profit organizations (43 grant awardees, 32 sponsorships) in twenty-three counties. The projects funded by these annual awards reach approximately 150,000 individuals each year.
